FROM THE PRINCIPAL'S DESK

Same but Different

Today we are supporting Pink Shirt Day to push back against bullying of all kinds and next Friday we celebrate International Day as we come together to share culture through food, song and dance.

At assembly this week I asked our students to talk to those around them and identify at least 3 differences between each other. Not surprisingly, most students identified at least 1 physical difference from hair and eye colour to height and gender. Some spoke about differences in their interests, family and foods they enjoy etc. My challenge to them this week has been to consider, if asked again, what differences other than physical ones, might they have with their friends?

The purpose of this question is to highlight two issues. The first being around their concept of 'normal' and how our perception of this can lead to division and potential conflict based solely on what we see. The second is to encourage them to look beyond the surface and get to know others on a deeper level. By asking them to focus on what makes us different we are encouraging them to consider how perhaps we are all as different as we are the same and that no one group should be singled out as abnormal or different.

In a world dominated by visual media it is little wonder our young people are quick to judge based on what they see. Our hope is by continuing this conversation over the term, we encourage some deeper thought and students begin to develop a greater awareness of their own actions and behaviours when it comes to how they look at and treat others.

Getting Involved

As Term 2 gets well and truly underway the number of opportunities has really started to take off. Whilst many students have managed to get involved and find something that excites them, there are still a good number yet to get themselves out there.

Last year when many of these events were not possible we noticed a change in the mood of the students. When we spoke to them, one thing they shared was that they really had not had many opportunities to try new things or meet new people. These extra-curricular activities are a hall mark of the Intermediate School experience and it these additional opportunities that build relationships, leadership, confidence, life skills and so much more.

Now would be a good time to have a conversation with your children and encourage them to get involved and make the most of everything that is on offer, if they have not already done so. The daily notices are available directly through the school app. This is a great place to see what is happening and look for opportunities that your young ones may be interested in.

The Auckland Writers Festival was an extraordinary and new experience for all of Remuera Intermediate's best writers. All of our time in class learning different sentences, skills and types of writing has really paid off! We got to meet amazing writers and authors from all around the world including Brian Selznick, Shilo Kino, Jesse O and Ben Brown.

Famous author from America, Brian Selznick, joined us via video call all the way from Rome, sharing all his best-selling books with us and one very special one. He chose us to be the first children in the world to preview his latest book: Kaleidoscope, which hasn't even been published yet! It is a book about hope in 26 different stories inspired by his own creations of art he made in lockdown. Revealing another mystery is the story behind the wonderful illustrations of the Harry Potter series covers also designed by Brian Selznick, which divulges a full piece of art explaining Harry Potter if all covers were put next to each other.

Another author we got to meet was an inspirational New Zealander who encouraged us to be proud of who we are. Shilo Kino was the writer of the book 'The Pōrangi Boy' meaning 'The Crazy Boy', which describes the life of a Maōri kid who tries to protect his land from being taken, alongside suffering the pain of bullying from other kids due to being different and Maōri. Shilo also encouraged us to love who we are and be proud of where we come from.

The next author that gave us the seed of a good story was Jesse O with her quote of 'Imagine'. Just by imagining, Jesse O wrote the book Locked Down in 2010 covering a story of what life would've been like if we all went into lockdown. Ten years later that story has come true in ways that are similar and different. Every young writer there had one favourite writer that spoke that day.

Our last speaker was many people's favourite, due to his absolute sense of humour. Ben Brown, named Reading Ambassador, shared his passion of reading with us hoping to motivate us to read a lot so we can help our little but creative brains to really focus and have the power to imagine a story.

Every one of us got inspired that day, with many goals and dreams to become such successful writers like them. Writing is the happiness of the world due to the power it gives us to imagine using our imagination.
